

<u>Gig Mill Primary - History Curriculum</u>



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Intent	We aim for Gig Mill children to be curious and enthusiastic about the past and to have the skills required to explore their own interests in every area of History, such as asking perceptive questions, think critically, weigh evidence, sift arguments, and develop perspective and judgement. This is taught through a varied and exciting curriculum, which is carefully sequenced and pitched to provide ample opportunities for all children to be Historians, using a range of primary and secondary sources through which the children discover the story of our past. It is important for children to develop a sense of identity through learning about the past and we want them to understand how history has shaped their own lives, alongside the local area and the wider world. Through the history curriculum children should develop an understanding of the diversity of societies and beliefs, and the complexity of people's lives and develop a sense of pride for Britain and it's achievements. Children should be able to make links between historical events and be able to compare and contrast concurrent world event, using chronology to explore cause and effect and come to their own conclusions.
